This is the eighth volume of the annual statistics on children and their families. The statistics were commissioned by the Ministry of Health and Social Affairs and comprise children in the ages 0–17.

Summary

Children and their families presents the situation for children from different perspectives. This year's report focuses on the age of the mother when the child is born.

Data are taken primarily from Statistics Sweden's total population register but, as a complement, different sample surveys and data from the National Social Insurance Board and the National Agency for Education are also used. The data are presented on a national level, apart from in Chapter 11, where some data are available at county and municipal level. The basic principle for statistics about children is that the children themselves are the reporting unit. An important source is therefore Statistics Sweden's surveys on living conditions in which children and young persons aged 10–18 years can speak for themselves.

Families with children

There are almost 1.1 million families in Sweden with children aged 0–17 living at home. Approximately two thirds of these families come under the term "traditional nuclear families", i.e. families with two parents in which all children are the couple's natural children.

The majority of families, 84 percent, have one or two children. Only 3 percent of families have four or more children.

Children in the population

Children aged 0–17 years make up slightly over one fifth of Sweden's population. The number of children of the different ages differs greatly. There are 130 000 children aged 15 while there are only 91 000 six year olds. Many children have links to other countries than Sweden. Of all children, 5 percent were themselves born abroad and 10 percent were born in Sweden with parents who were *both* born abroad. Many of these children have backgrounds from Iraq and the former Yugoslavian countries. Roughly 10 percent of all children have one foreignborn parent and one Swedish-born parent. In total, therefore, 25 percent of all children under the age of 18 have links to other countries than Sweden.

Changes in population among children

A total of 49 310 girls and 52 036 boys were born in 2005. Slightly over one third of these were the parents' first child and the parents were most commonly aged around 30 when they were born.

Approximately 15 000 children immigrated during the year and around 7 600 children emigrated. Slightly over 1 000 children were adopted from another country.

Parents and siblings

Three quarters of all children aged 0-17 years live with both their original parents. Over 90 percent of children aged 0 and 1 year live with both parents but this share decreases as the children get older. Among 17 year olds, 40 percent live with only one of their original parents.

The majority of children have siblings. Among 8 year old children, 89 percent live with at least one sibling. Children of that age most often have all their siblings living at home.

Parental separations

Slightly over 47 000 children under the age of 18 lived through a parental separation in 2005. This corresponds to 3 percent of all children whose parents were either married or cohabiting at the end of 2004. Separations are more common among cohabiting parents than married parents. Separations are also more common in families where there are children from previous relationships, reconstructed families, than in families where there are only natural children. Separations also become more common the younger the mother was when she had children.

Over a half a million children live apart from at least one of their parents. The majority of these children live with their mother. Only 17 percent of children live with their father.

Children with deceased parents

Roughly 3 000 children had a parent who died in 2005. In slightly over two thirds of cases, it was the father who died. In total, nearly 26 000 children have lost a parent during their lifetime. Around 300 children have lost both their parents. It is more likely that children with older mothers have lost a parent.

Housing

It is more common for children to live in a house than in an apartment. 58 percent of all children live in a detached house and a further 13 percent live in a terraced or linked house. Young children, children with single parents and children in larger cities are more likely to live in apartment buildings than other children.

Nearly half of all children live in families who have access to a holiday home. It is often a relative who actually owns this house. Older children, children with cohabiting parents, children living in rural areas and children whose mother was older when they were born are more likely to live in families with a holiday home that they themselves own.

Parents' employment and parental leave

The majority of children have parents who work. 80 percent of all children aged 0-17 years have a mother who is part of the labour force and 90 percent of children have a father who is part of the labour force. Many mothers work parttime or are on parental leave while fathers most often work full-time.

Children aged 10-18 years more often feel that their fathers do not have time for them than that their mothers do not. However, the majority of children say that their parents always or almost always have time to talk to or do something with them.

Child care

A large proportion of all children are registered at a pre-school, family daycare unit or after-school centre. Registration is highest among five year olds, with 97 percent being registered for child care. A majority of children of school age attend an after-school centre, up to the age of 9.

Municipal child care is the most common form, with only 9 percent of pre-school children in child care under private management.

Family economies from different perspectives

6 percent of all children live in families with a low disposable income. The economy in families varies during a child's lifetime, depending on the family situation. Older children are more likely to live in a well-off family than younger children. Children with single parents or with only one gainfully employed parent are often worse off than children living with two gainfully employed parents.

One fifth of all children live in families in which the parents claim to have difficulties with regular expenses. Among children aged 10-18, about one third claim that they cannot afford to take part in various activities with their friends.
